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Letter from Our President/CEO

Dear Friends,

As I look back on 2024, I am filled with gratitude for God's faithfulness and the transformational work He continues to do through Youth Horizons. Every story of healing, step toward wholeness, and life touched by this ministry is a testimony to His power, mercy, and grace.

At Youth Horizons, our mission is not only to serve vulnerable youth but to walk alongside them with the love of Christ, helping them discover their God-given worth and purpose. This past year, we witnessed that mission come alive in remarkable ways.

Through our Mentor Program, 132 youth were matched with caring Christian mentors - 40 of them new matches in 2024 alone. Thirty-three of these relationships have lasted



over five years, and 10 high school seniors were mentored to graduation. These aren't just numbers; they represent deep, life-changing relationships that reflect the heart of Jesus - steady, sacrificial, and full of hope.

Our Residential Foster Care programs also saw incredible movement:

• **At Kinloch Price Boys Ranch, we welcomed 66 long-term placements and provided 1,381 emergency overnight placements.**

• **At Wren House for girls, we had 24 long-term placements and 525 emergency overnight stays.**

These homes are more than safe places - they are sacred spaces where children and teens encounter love, structure, and healing rooted in the Gospel. I am profoundly thankful for our incredible staff, whose unwavering dedication, compassion,

and Christ-centered service are the backbone of this ministry and a daily reflection of God's love to the youth we serve. Daily, they live out Galatians 6:2: "Carry each other's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ."

The stories of young people like Tristan, Miss N, and Mr. R - who overcame educational gaps, addiction, and deep emotional wounds - remind us that true transformation happens in relationship, community, and Christ.

As we step into a new year, may we continue to be faithful stewards of the call God has placed on this ministry. Let us lead with courage, love without limits, and serve with the unwavering truth of the Gospel.

Thank you for standing with us in this Kingdom work.

Answering the Call

At Youth Horizons, our work centers on three key pillars – mentorship, foster care, and advocacy – all grounded in faith and a deep commitment to helping young people thrive.

Mentoring: Building Life-Changing Relationships

For over 30 years, our mentoring program has paired caring Christian adults with children and youth who need consistent guidance, positive role models, and a deeper sense of belonging. These one-on-one relationships offer hope, encouragement, and support that can change the course of a young person's life.



Foster Residences: Safe, Faith-Based Care

Our residential foster homes provide a structured, nurturing environment for boys and girls facing serious life challenges. With trauma-informed, evidence-based care rooted in faith, our trained and compassionate staff help youth build stability, work through past trauma, and move toward a healthier, more hopeful future.



Advocacy: Championing Generational Change

We advocate for children, young adults, and families across the Wichita area – raising awareness, building partnerships, and driving systemic change. Through speaking engagements, training, community collaboration, and social media outreach, we bring attention to the urgent challenges our youth face and help build pathways toward long-term, generational transformation.

In 2024, the Youth Horizons Mentor Program fostered life-changing one-to-one relationships, celebrating 40 new matches, 33 five-year-plus bonds, and 10 mentored graduates. Stories like Raevyn's courageous battle with leukemia, Corban's baptism, and Tristan's culinary path showed mentoring's impact—supported by 40+ churches and community partners committed to helping youth thrive.

- A mentor took their mentee to a **Chiefs game via private jet** – memories made for a lifetime.
- The **Awards Party** celebrated **14 mentor program graduates**.
- Male and Female Mentors of the Year Archie Eutsler (Ridgepoint Church) and Staci Dekat (Cross Road Church)
- **Resiliency Training** for parents, mentors, and protégés helped grow physical, emotional, spiritual, and relational strength.
- A mother-daughter mentoring team – Gail and Val – volunteered together with **protégés Aubri and Amari** at the Ronald McDonald House.

Matt & Tristan: Nine Years of Growth, Friendship, and Purpose

For nine years, mentor Matt Hampton walked alongside his protégé Tristan, sharing everything from fishing and kayaking adventures to family game nights and spiritual conversations. “A lot of mentoring was at our house,” Matt says. “Tristan came over and just became part of our family.”

Now graduated from Valley Center High School, Tristan is pursuing his dream of becoming a chef. With Matt’s steady encouragement, he gained hands-on experience working as a lead cook and trainer at several Applebee’s restaurants.

In January 2024, the Youth Horizons mentor coach team arranged a tour of WSU Tech’s NICHE culinary school, where Tristan met

celebrity chefs Lexi and John Michaels and spent time with chef and entrepreneur Greg Cole from Butler Community College. Tristan’s mother, Cindy, joined the tour – a powerful day of vision casting for Tristan’s future.

Reflecting on his mentorship journey, Tristan said, “I don’t think I would be where I’m at without him... honestly.” That relationship has been more than educational – it’s been transformational. As Matt recalled, “We were in the car and Tristan said, ‘I really feel like I’ve gone through a spiritual awakening.’”

From shared meals to big decisions, Matt and Tristan’s story was a vivid reminder of how long-term mentoring changes lives – one weekly visit at a time.



Staff Baptisms: A Light For Others

At Youth Horizons, we believe faith is a daily way of life, not just a Sunday practice — and Malik, our Transportation, Compliance, and House Support Specialist at Kinloch Price Boys Ranch, exemplifies that belief.

As a mentor and role model, Malik lives out the values of integrity, perseverance, and hope in his work with young men who’ve faced significant challenges. His recent baptism at Life Church in Derby, KS was a powerful public declaration of his faith, setting an inspiring example for those he serves.

Stories like Malik’s reflect the heart of our mission: to bring hope and healing through Christ-centered relationships, and we celebrate his boldness in living out his faith with authenticity and purpose.

At KPBR, the focus is on creating a relational environment where boys can heal, develop, and prepare for the next stage of life. For youth who have experienced neglect, abuse, or the loss of family support, letting go of harmful coping mechanisms and survival instincts presents a significant challenge. Equally difficult is learning to value the consistent effort required for personal growth and future readiness. The persistence of KPBR staff, along with strong partnerships with therapeutic and community resources, plays a crucial role in changing the life trajectory of the residents.

Life at KPBR: A Focus on Learning

Teaching and practice are important elements of what we offer boys at KPBR. Below are some examples of areas where our residents had the opportunity to learn and grow.

Practical Life Skills

- Cooking, menu planning, and shopping
- Cleaning house, deep cleaning, and laundry
- Personal Hygiene
- Saving and managing money
- Home and property maintenance
- Driving
- Applying for jobs

Emotional & Social Growth

- Empathy, patience, and perseverance
- Journaling and identifying struggles
- Emotional boundaries and knowing when to express opinions
- Self-care

Wren House exists to provide hope, healing, and home to girls in foster care, most who have experienced trauma. In 2024, our girls grew academically, socially, emotionally, and spiritually. They began to believe in their own potential – and we had the honor of walking beside them.

Life at Wren: A Year of Learning

Beyond academics and spiritual growth, girls at Wren House are taught crucial life skills that prepare them for independence and healing. In 2024, girls learned:

Practical Life Skills

- Cooking, portioning food, and nutrition
- Cleaning house, deep cleaning, and laundry
- Hygiene and caring for personal belongings
- Vehicle maintenance and how to prevent frozen pipes
- Budgeting and time management

Spiritual Development

- How to pray
- Guarding your heart and resisting temptation
- Knowing their identity in Christ

Our Impact: Kinloch Price Boys Ranch



From Setback to Success

When Mr. E returned to Kinloch Price Boys Ranch at age 17, he had only a handful of high school credits. After leaving the Ranch years earlier, he'd spent his days caring for younger siblings instead of attending school. He was behind and facing a future with limited options.

But this time, something was different. With steady support from his KPBR House Coach staff, Case Coordinator, and our Education Coordinator, Mr. E was enrolled in a GED program. He worked hard and earned his diploma in just over three months. A few weeks later, he secured his first part-time job at Pizza Hut and began learning to manage his own money.

Though he initially fell short of admission to a technical school, his advocate stepped in. Together, they connected with Wichita State University, and Mr. E was accepted to begin WSU in Fall 2025 with a focus in Psychology. He's taken steps toward independence – more hopeful, employed, and enrolled in college. His story is a testament to resilience, second chances, and the power of people who won't give up on you.



From Struggle to Strength

When Mr. R came to Kinloch Price Boys Ranch from juvenile detention, he had been through so much more than most his age. His reading was below a first-grade level, and despite his teenage years he couldn't yet write his name. With parental rights severed, his future was uncertain.

In his first year at KPBR, he attended a behavior-focused school while receiving extra tutoring over the summer – and slowly, things began to shift. With steady encouragement and personalized support, he caught up enough to transition into a public school. By his second semester, he had joined the football team – something once unthinkable.

In less than two years, Mr. R was reading at a fifth-grade level and gaining confidence by the day. His social worker praised KPBR's role in his transformation, noting how well the team had rallied around him.

Mr. R became an adoption candidate, and his story was a moving reminder of what belief, teamwork, and relentless care can make possible.

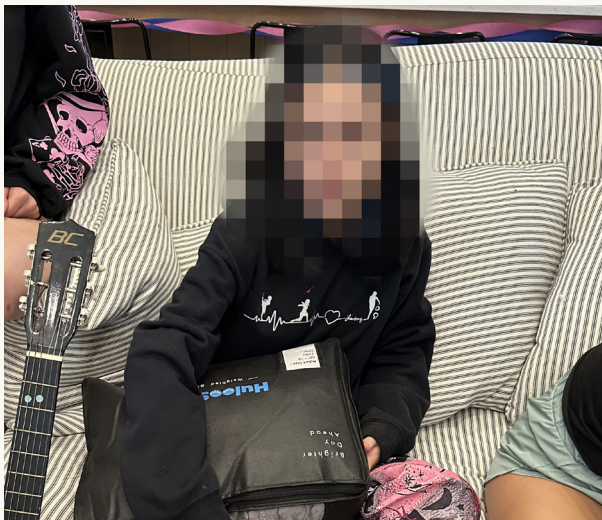
From Lost to Found

When Miss N arrived at Wren House, she was quiet, withdrawn, and caught in a cycle of running away and marijuana addiction. She didn't speak to staff or engage with other residents. Her past had left her guarded, struggling, and unsure of who to trust.

Slowly, something began to change. With consistent therapy, drug treatment, and steady care from Wren House staff, Miss N began to open up. She started connecting with others, greeting people again, and facing her recovery with courage and determination.

Her transformation deepened with time. She found faith, placing her trust in Jesus and finding new purpose. In time, she reintegrated into her family home – sober, smiling, and speaking words of kindness.

Miss N's journey was a testament to healing, structure, and spiritual renewal – and to the dedicated team who were honored to walk alongside her every step of the way.



From Resistance to Reconnection

When Miss R arrived at Wren House, she was in crisis. Angry and defensive, she frequently argued with staff, made serious threats, and refused to follow even the most basic rules. Every day brought new tension as she resisted the structure and guidance offered by those trying to help her.

Behind the defiance was a girl who needed stability, patience, and connection. Wren staff helped guide her step by step, teaching fundamental life skills – like following instructions, managing frustration, and showing respect. The turning point came during her birthday celebration, when each person shared what they appreciated about her. That moment of acceptance shifted something inside her.

Miss R began to soften. She took responsibility for her actions, apologized to those she had hurt, and began to earn trust. She was eventually able to return home, more in control, respectful, and hopeful.

Miss R's story reflected the power of consistency, kindness, and a community that chose not to give up – even when the path was hard.
